Some places of interest - Part 3

After last month's look at some places to the north, we are now heading south this time to look at some historic houses and windmills:-

Buckden Towers PE19 5TA

A medieval fortified house and bishop's palace. Katherine of Aragon was held here after her divorce from Henry VIII. Now owned by the Claretian Missionaries, it is used as a retreat and study centre. The gardens are open for visitors during daylight hours but the main buildings are not open to the public. More details on the Buckden towers website.



Wimpole SG8 0BW

An impressive mansion with extensive parkland, gardens and a rare breed farm. Cafés and a large car park. The property is owned by the National Trust. There are special events throughout the year, including a winter wonderland experience from 21 November to 3 January. See the National Trust website for more details.



Kimbolton Castle PE28 0EA

Kimbolton Castle is also a private day and boarding school. There are regular public open days and the option of booking private group tours. It was the last residence of Katherine of Aragon before her death in 1536. The castle in its present form dates from 1690 to 1720. See the Kimbolton Castle website for more details.



Great Gransden SG19 3AG

The Great Gransden windmill is one of the oldest surviving windmills in England, constructed c. 1612. It isn't open to visitors. The mill is currently owned and maintained by Cambridgeshire County Council and it is planned to hand over management of the mill to a charitable trust once the current repairs are complete.



Longstowe Hall CB23 2UH

An historic country estate just off the A1198 which is available for hire. The gardens are open to the public on specific dates. The opening dates for 2026 will be published on the Longstowe Hall website in January.



Great Chishill SG8 8SD

Great Chishill's 200-year old windmill is at the highest point in Cambridgeshire and has been restored by the Great Chishill Windmill Trust. See the Great Chishill Windmill Trust's website for details of open days.



First there were the jolly and delicious Safari Suppers over several years, in aid of MacMillan Cancer Support. There were three Fringe on the Fen events, when choirs, music of all kinds, orchestras, bands, comedians and other performers flooded the village for a week and raised over £100,000 for charity – an enormous undertaking.

Nigel was instrumental in the production and development of The Journal, an award-winning magazine covering three villages. Shetland - Britain's **Northernmost Islands**

As the Shetland Islands lie about 110 miles north of the mainland of Scotland, they are not the first choice for many tourists. It used to take me about 10 hours to get from Hilton to Lerwick, the islands' capital, so it would have been quicker and easier to get to almost anywhere else in Europe! Though having been to the islands quite a few times over the years, I think the journey is well worth the effort.

The islands have a lot to offer visitors, particularly if you are interested in wildlife or ancient history and, of course, the islands are also famous for knitwear and Shetland ponies. The TV crime drama series, Shetland, has shown some of the islands' spectacular scenery and glimpses of what island life is like for the 24,000 inhabitants, though it has grossly exaggerated the crime rate!

In total, there are about 100 islands, scattered between Fair Isle and Muckle Flugga of which 16 are inhabited. The main part of the archipelago (excluding Fair Isle) is about 70 miles long and it has over 1.600 miles of coastline, which includes the largest tombolo in the UK at St Ninian's Isle (see photo).

If you fly to Shetland, as many visitors do, you will land at Sumburgh airport, on the southern tip of the main island.




Mainland. The airport is on one of the few areas of flattish ground on the island - and even then, the runway juts out into the sea at both ends and has a road running across it!

Sumburgh is a remarkable place because, together with the Jarlshof site nearby, it boasts examples of human habitation over four thousand years, including an iron age broch, a viking village as well as the much more modern lighthouse and airport.

It is impossible to cover all that the islands have to offer in a short piece like this, so I will just pick out some of the things that appeal

The first example has to be Mousa Broch. Over 2,000 years old, this multi-storied circular drystone tower is about 13m high and is the best surviving example anywhere. Like other brochs, it has a double wall, with a total width of about 5m and a narrow, low, entrance passageway. There is an internal staircase between the walls which leads to the top of the tower. Once, there were hundreds of brochs in northern Scotland and the islands but few remain because the stone from most of them has been "repurposed" for crofts and houses. Mousa has been spared from the plunder of its stones partly because it is on an uninhabited island - and I suspect also because the island is the home of a colony of (very aggressive) arctic terns, which would deter any "stone merchant" before the building came under the protection of Historic Environment Scotland.

The islands' capital, Lerwick, is about 20 miles north of Sumburgh and a substantial part of Shetland's second-largest broch, Clickimin, is still standing at the southern end of the town. Lerwick is home to about 7.000 people and its sheltered harbour is the main ferry port for ferries to the other islands in the group. It also houses an award-winning museum which showcases examples of the islands' textile heritage as well as giving an insight into Shetland's cultural heritage. I

was also very interested in their exhibition on the complex geology of the islands.

Scalloway, the ancient capital, is the secondlargest town and is on the western seaboard. It is dominated by a forbidding castle, built in 1600 by the tyrannical Earl Patrick Stewart, who met an untimely end in 1615 - but that is another story. Perhaps the town's best claim to fame is as the base for the clandestine "Shetland Bus" operation during World War 2, which provided a regular transport link between Britain and the Norwegian Resistance, who were carrying out acts of sabotage against the German forces who were occupying Norway.

Further north, there is the eight-mile long inlet from the sea, Sullom Voe, which was once Britain's largest oil terminal. At its peak, the terminal handled an average of over 1,200,000 barrels per day of crude oil but it is now in decline and handles only about a tenth of that amount. Right at the start of operations the Shetland Islands Council

wisely negotiated a modest levy on every barrel of oil for the Shetland Charitable Trust. As of March last year, the Trust's assets were valued at over £430million, which partly explains why the roads on Shetland are so good and why every school in Shetland has a swimming pool!

At the western end of Sullom Voe, there is a narrow isthmus, called Mavis Grind, where the North Sea and the Atlantic Ocean almost

meet and it is said that you can throw a stone from one sea to the other (though that's probably only true at high tide).

The nearest township to Sullom Voe is Brae, which claims to have the northernmost Chinese takeaway in the UK. Another of its claims to fame is the lengthy legal battle over probate for the Busta House Hotel, pictured, which Charles Dickens fictionalised as "Jarndyce vs Jarndyce" for his novel, Bleak House.

But for me, my best memory of Brae is going to the Up Helly Aa celebration some years ago, when hundreds of people with burning torches marched to the harbour and set fire to a replica of a Viking Ship.

There are a number of Up Helly Aa celebrations in the islands, which are held around New Year. The most famous one is in Lerwick and the one I went to at Brae was the last in the season. Many hours of preparation go into these festivals, not least making the replica ships and the Viking costumes.

I remember standing by the boathouse chatting to a fireman, who was also enjoying the spectacle.

Afterwards, the celebrations went on well into the early hours with many talented acts from local performers in the hall.

Trains, Boats and Planes

Further north, there is a fine folk museum at Tangwick Haa on the Northmavine peninsula and some spectacular sea views around Eshaness.

Further north still, there may some exciting projects coming up for two of the islands, Yell and Unst. The Bluemull sound between them is the site of the world's first tidal power generation array and there are likely to more projects around the islands in the future.

There is also proposal that these two islands may be linked by tunnels to Mainland

(Shetland that is) to replace the roll-on/roll-off ferries. And as Saxa Vord, at the northernmost tip of Unst, is already the first fully licensed vertical spaceport in Europe, there could be a boom time ahead for Shetland's northernmost islands.

Finally, if you are planning to visit Shetland, please bear in mind that at 60° North, the days are very much longer in the summer than they are here – you can read outside at midnight - but the days are very much shorter in the winter!



Early Days and Memories of Hilton Annual Bonfire

I thought readers might be interested in my earliest memories of Hilton Annual Bonfire so, the first thing to do was to dispatch husband, Ian, to the Parish Council Archives in Huntingdon Library to research and help me with those memories during a mid-1970's - mid 1980's period:

In 1975 an NHS promotional job move saw us both and our expected first-born leaving glorious Wotton-under-Edge, Gloucestershire, for the much flatter lands of Cambridgeshire but we were lucky to have found a comfortable little house to rent, Manor Cottage on The Green, owned by local farmer George Britten. Being in Round Table, Ian made contact with the local one, eventually becoming friends with fellow Tabler Geoff Fleming also living in Hilton

- it was he who urged us to check out new houses being built in the village. We viewed and reserved one, little realising that both our son and house would arrive within 2 weeks of each other, around Christmas!

Whilst still in the cottage and during a conversation with George, Ian mentioned the annual Round Table bonfire he'd been involved with in Wotton, as a result the Parish Council asked Ian to think about organising one for Hilton, to which he agreed.

Eventually a sub-committee of willing helpers was gathered to make plans for our first-ever Bonfire Night, planned for November 1976 and the site - still being used to-day - was agreed for The Wilderness.

Over the coming months plans were gradually drawn up, with lan tasked in locating and ordering fireworks, tracking down Standard Fireworks Co. in Huddersfield, which duly arrived packed in large wooden crates and stored in the garage of our new home (handy box for coal storage after the event).

Nearer the date the team then had the fun task deciphering instructions which came with each of the displays, bearing in mind they were all novices, probably only ever having shop-bought fireworks before, usually stored in an old biscuit tin for safety!

Way back then there was no 'tech' to get information out to the villagers, just word of mouth. Councillors delivered letters to all households, and notices on the village notice boards (still very much in use to-day), and notices on stakes beside each road into the village.

George would fire up his trusty tractor/trailer and, followed round the village by cubs and scouts, old wood and dry garden cuttings were happily tossed into the trailer. Local farmers also donated straw to set underneath the bonfire to help with the burn.

There was more fun for children to construct their own Guy Fawkes - one year 8 appeared, judged then tossed high up onto the fire most probably BEFORE ignition!

Parish Council ladies would sell and serve refreshments but there appears to be little reference in the Archives as to what was provided. There was mention in later years of the WI helping but I am sure there would have been others either from Hilton Village Hall Committee, Playgroup Committee (with parent helpers) also Housewives Register.

At last, set-up morning arrived and the team had to work out where individual displays would be erected. One very important task was for the BOMBS involving an especially supplied strong tube inserted into a handdug 3ft deep x 6in wide tube (you work it out!). Believe it or not these were set off individually with instructions to "light the blue touch paper and retreat to a safe distance".... There were also the usual rockets, Roman candles and Catherine wheels, all lit by blue touch-paper. Two tall wooden poles were erected then strung across the gap ready for, what would be, the finale for the evening.

Ian along with Doug Smith (late of now-called 'Douglas Cottage' Grove End, farm labourer for George) were asked to light the fire which was successfully carried out and crowds of villagers of all ages eagerly stood as near as possible, feeling the heat from the roaring flames - there were no restricting barriers in those days, we just moved back when we got too hot!

The first 'BOOM' from the first bomb rocket lit up the night skies and a truly successful

evening unfolded. The grand finale was ignited and 2 cannons fired at each other across the gap between the 2 poles then the words "Good Night" gave a last sparkling ending signalling clapping and cheering from those gathered. Later accounts showed a profit of £57.75 was raised and, following encouraging comments and letters of thanks, the Parish Council agreed takings would be paid into an account for the following year/s.

Further Thoughts From The Early Years:

Other bonfires have occasionally been lit, usually for National celebrations including the 1977 Silver Jubilee, Royal weddings etc. The newspaper report, (overleaf) describes the Hilton bonfire at the Coronation in 1953.

Standard Fireworks were a success but, in the late 1980's, supplies were sourced locally from the Rev Ron Lancaster, chemistry master of Kimbolton School - inventing fireworks being a weekend hobby! Darryl Fleming (Hilton) attended Kimbolton and enjoyed helping out.

(Up-to-date footnote on Kimbolton Fireworks:- after leaving the school, student Darryl set up an extremely successful and highly regarded fireworks display company securing displays for many international shows, taking him over the world and, still on New Year's Eve, we can all watch his shows on our TVs for London's prestigious annual event. However, all his fireworks lighting is far removed from the old blue touch-paper days, it's all highly controlled by electronics, probably a lot more stressful than FUN!).

Step into the Past

Over those first years, word slowly got round other villages about the bonfire in Hilton but, not only did this mean more and more people driving and parking on The Green, it was also noted a gradual, year-on-year increase in size of the fire... one time a 3-piece suite, and another occasion a fully glazed door were tossed on, this being particularly dangerous as children thought the growing heap was a superb play area! They ALL played out happily in those long-ago days! A decision was made to restrict 'donations' which meant volunteers who were available during any one day, having to monitor entry to The Wilderness. Later a lockable barrier was erected and this proved a success and collection/building was carried out on a much shorter time scale.

On one occasion the bonfire grew ENORMOUSLY beforehand, I must say it did cause a certain amount of 'glee' and 'anticipation' amongst children who watched its growth with eagerness to see it ablaze. However, one year, a nearby oak tree was spotted with a suspicious flaming and smouldering effect, the Fire BRIGADE were called, quickly extinguishing the flames, leaving after some stern words about drastically cutting the size of any future bonfires.....

Once again the children were - literally - well catered for as, the morning afterwards they turned up with foil -wrapped potatoes and tossed them round the still smouldering mound, returning home with their wellies a 'little bit melted' but, as long as the kids were happy... nobody ever got burnt.

Ticket prices and sales gradually increased from 5p, yes, you did read that right! By 1989 increased to £1.20. The first fireworks purchased cost £54.00 and modest profits continued to be made going towards the following year's purchases. Safety and insurance came to the fore, as an example:children were handed a sparkler on arrival with a bucket of water "just in case" then over the years these were changed to 'glow lights' of all shapes. A line of burning 'candles' on poles lit the way along Wraggs Row up to the Wilderness. A barrier was fixed round the bonfire area included the fireworks display 'arena'.

Sadly 1982 was not able to gather enough

volunteers and for the first time only, this was abandoned.

There were so many willing helpers over that early decade, e.g. when George was unable to use his tractor, Bruce Whatley, who had moved with his young family to Hilton in early 80's, volunteered his large van to load bonfire burnables, also transporting down crates of fireworks and equipment/refreshment tables etc during the morning. There are still some, now retired, early days volunteer Hiltonians with others still attending and enjoying the show - a huge "thank you" must be made to them all for beginning a fabulous annual social gathering. Ian never thought that, back in 1976 Hilton's first Bonfire Night would still be running in such a magical setting.

Save precious palliative care beds at **Arthur Rank Hospice**



Over the past month, I have received countless messages from constituents concerned about cuts to funding at our local Arthur Rank Hospice.

Alongside my Cambridgeshire Liberal Democrat colleagues, Charlotte Cane and Pippa Heylings, I wrote to the Secretary of State, Wes Streeting, and visited the hospice itself. We then launched a petition to show the Government just how much the service means to people locally. Our petition gained over 10,000 signatures in its first 24 hours, and at the time of writing that number now sits at over 16,000.

On the 3rd of November, I joined my constituent Vivien from Fen Drayton, whose husband was supported by Arthur Rank before he died from a rare cancer in November 2024, to deliver the petition to 10 Downing Street. We called on the Prime Minister and his government to restore the cut funding and ensure that all 23 beds at Arthur Rank remain open; to provide longterm, sustainable funding for the hospice's palliative care services; and to properly roll out nationally the move from hospital to community care, with hospices and GPs at its heart.

Thank you to everyone who signed the petition and who continue to support our campaign – I will continue to share any updates on its progress on my social media pages.

Local Business Visits

Over the summer, I enjoyed making the most of the opportunity away from Westminster to spend more time in the constituency; meeting with local organisations, visiting schools and businesses, and learning about the issues that matter to people in our area.

One of these visits was to Centrado Trading, a family-run supplier of picture framing materials who moved into their purpose-built Fenstanton HQ in 2023. I visited the team to speak to them about this investment in sustainability, as well as the impressive growth of their business receiving a loan from Lloyds Bank's Clean Growth Financing Initiative, they have been able to massively boost their capacity and grow operations while also improving their energy use and efficiency. Like many Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs), they face many challenges in the current business environment, but it's clear that local family businesses like this are vital to our economy, creating jobs and investing in our community.

More recently, I enjoyed speaking to residents on the doorstep in Fenstanton about local issues from healthcare to housing – and of course pausing for lunch at Little Piggy on the High Street with my Lib Dem team!





Afoot in the Garden

Deep midwinter memories

My memory tells me that still air days only occur during blazing hot summers and the depths of winter. Adding the scent from the fragrant smoke of a fire with apple wood pruning's intensifies the memory. Today it's a lost memory because we have green bins for our prunings and should not burn our trimmings. Smells on sunny winter are so powerful because they tell us that the garden is still alive. Fragrant plants flowering on warmer winter days include winter Honeysuckles esp. 'x purpusii', Chimonanthus (Winter sweet), Clematis cirrhose balearica, Witch hazel (hamamelis) especially 'Pallida', skimmia, viburnum x bodnantense, and liriope. As the days start to lengthen acacia dealbata (silver wattle) *, Azalea mollis, clematis- armandii, coronilla glauca*, daphne, mahonia, and sarcococca (winter box) fill our gardens with fragrance. If your pruning, many herbs and shrubs have aromatic foliage and wood. * Plants require a sheltered position.



When pruning bush roses remember the old saying 'The harder you prune the harder they grow' and don't forget your gloves. Prune out dead wood and crossing branches first, then aim to leave the branches equally spaced. Many a fruit tree has masses of small fruit that don't ripen properly. Thinning and de-cluttering the branches will reduce fruit set leading to larger fruit, allow more air and light which will reduce diseases and help ripening. Prune branches of shrubs that shade lawns shrubs, especially evergreens, and tidy up perennials. Continue to gather up fallen leaves for the compost heap or the green bin.

You can still plant trees shrubs and perennials during mild spells including bare root roses and hedging. In severe weather protect pots and tubs, (wrap them to a wall if you can), and don't forget to drain out hose pipes, fittings and turn off/wrap outside taps.







Four-day week The secretary of state has written to SCDC expressing serious concerns regarding the four-day week way of working and whether this is providing value for money for council tax payers.

As a result, I demanded an emergency council meeting to discuss the letter and its response. The administration cannot be forced to discontinue the project, but I would suggest that the government can apply significant pressure to make it happen – we will see!

Major developments Locally, there has been significant development regarding planning applications along the A14/A1307. I wrote about the Boxworth Gateway logistic site and Bar Hill to Oakington proposals in September, but there is now a further site between Lolworth and Bar Hill.

The sites will provide a variety of job opportunities, but will also increase traffic on local roads. In addition there are concerns around surface and sewage water that will be sent to Uttons Drove sewage works which is currently over capacity.

A meeting of all interested parties and authorities is planned for late November. I hope I will have more positive news in the future.

Unitary authorities An emergency full council meeting will debate plans for the

new unitary authorities, with business cases for the proposed options. SCDC's administration has opted for a South Cambridgeshire/Cambridge City unitary. The government will make a decision in the new year before the May elections.

Local Plan SCDC has launched its proposals for the new Local Plan which is out for consultation from 1 December to 30 January. Some of the key proposals locally are 13,000 new houses in Cambourne North (nearly stretching to Elsworth), 11,000 in Waterbeach and 10,800 in Northstowe. I will look closely at the availability of fresh water and where it will be treated, infrastructure and viability.

Step into the Past



According to the Met Office, Summer 2025 was the warmest UK summer on record, though conditions varied markedly across the 4 Nations. Southern, Central and Eastern England including East Anglia were the warmest areas. This follows the UK's warmest Spring on record. It was also the equal warmest Summer with 1976 based on the Central England temperature series from 1659, though in 1976 there were nearly twice as many "heatwave" days (30°C or 86°F). The warmest day I recorded was on 11 July when 32.4°C (90.3°F) was reached. The warmest night was on 19 July when the temperature remained above 19°C (66.2°F).

It was hardly surprising that during a Summer dominated by high pressure this led to several lengthy dry spells especially in June and August, where my records for those two months gave a combined total of just 0.84 of an inch (21.5mm) of precipitation. The continued lack of rain was particularly unwelcome in parts of England including East Anglia where the dry Summer followed the driest Spring since 1893.

The Summer was also sunnier than average with only one day being completely sunless during the 3 Summer months, making a total of just 3 sunless days for the 6 months since 1 March.

The generally benign weather continued through most of September. Two isolated days, the 7th and the 18th brought a surge of tropical air lifting the temperature to 26°C

(77.8°F) and 26.7°C (79°F) respectively. The month brought two wet days, both delivering half of an inch, otherwise the dry theme continued. By the end of September the total rainfall for the year was just under 10.5 inches (240 mm.) which is well below normal.

October brought a reminder that autumn had arrived with two named storms, Amy and Benjamin, both bringing very windy unsettled weather. Sunless days also returned with at least 10 such days during the month.

Looking worldwide, with global ocean temperatures around 2°C higher than normal, this served to increase the intensity of typhoons and hurricanes. The most notable hurricane was Melissa, a category 5 storm with winds of up to 185 mph which wreaked catastrophic destruction and loss of life in the Caribbean, especially in Haiti, Jamaica and Cuba. At least 50 people died.

Further afield, extreme heat through Summer this year continued to grip the Northern Hemisphere and break records. Japan had its hottest July on record during which a new highest temperature of 41.8°C (106°F) was recorded in Tokyo in August. During the same heatwave South Korea recorded 22 consecutive tropical nights, one of which failed to fall below 29.3°C (35°F). In normally temperate Finland this Summer they recorded 22 days when 30°C (86°F) was exceeded.

"The Gate of the Year"

A poem called 'God Knows' by Minnie Louise Haskins

On Dec 25th 1939, King George VI broadcasts to the Empire. It was this broadcast that firmly established the Royal Christmas message as a British tradition.



Dressed in the uniform of the Admiral of the Fleet, sitting in front of two microphones on a table at Sandringham, King George VI spoke live to offer a message of reassurance to his people.

It was to be a landmark speech and was to have an important effect on the listening public as they were plunged into the uncertainty of war:

He said; "A new year is at hand. We cannot tell what it will bring. If it brings peace, how thankful we shall all be. If it brings us continued struggle we shall remain undaunted." He went on to quote from Minnie Haskins' poem "The Gate of the Year" (1908).

"I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year, 'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.' And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness, and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be better than light, and safer than a known way."

"The Gate of the Year" is the popular name given to a poem by Minnie Louise Haskins. The title given to it by the author was "God Knows".

Background

The poem, published in 1908, was part of a collection titled The Desert. It caught the public attention and the popular imagination when the then Princess Elizabeth handed a copy to her father, King George VI.

The poem was widely acclaimed as inspirational, reaching its first mass audience in the early days of the Second World War. Its words remained a source of comfort to the late Queen for the rest of her life, and she had its words engraved on brass plagues and fixed to the gates of the King George VI Memorial Chapel at Windsor Castle, where the King was interred. Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother was also buried here in 2002, and the words of "The Gate of the Year" were read out at her

First part of the poem:

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:

"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."

So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East."

Tree Survey

The Council approved the Open Spaces' Officer's recommendations for work costing £1600 in respect of 5 trees, subject to approval from the District Council: and was advised similar work (relating to other trees that are also the responsibility of the Parish Council) is likely to require greater funding in future years.

The Major Oak

The Council took note of feedback that the recommendation of the arboreal consultant to take only 5% off the crown volume is intended to prevent unnecessary 'shock' to this tree. An application to carry out the recommended work is being made to the District Council, and to obtain suitable quotations for the work.

Daffodils

The Council agreed to a parishioner's request to allow the purchase, at no cost to the Council, of daffodil bulbs to be planted by members of the Community Garden in front of the churchyard boundary wall between Church End and Church Lane; subject to consultation with the Churchwardens about whether this will impinge on any plans they have to repair the churchyard boundary walls.

County Cllr David Keane informed the Parish Council that Cambridgeshire County Council has put forward to the Secretary of State 'Option A' (from a list of 5 options on the table) as its preferred recommendation for Local Government Reorganisation. He drew attention to the provision of EV chargers now available at the St Ives' Park and Ride.

Budget and Precept

Following publication of the proposed budget and precept for 2026/7, and there being no feedback from parishioners, the Council approved formally the budget in the sum of £45,770 and a modest increase in the precept to £41,570 which is an increase of £1,744 or 4.4%.

Fireworks event

The Council agreed to the purchase of additional lightweight fencing materials to facilitate the

safety of parishioners attending the event on November 8th.

Street Lights

The Council took note that authorisation has been given for the replacement of its 8 remaining sodium lamps with LED lanterns; which will contribute to future energy savings

Equipment

The Council agreed a budget provision to enable the purchase of Christmas lights to be hung round the Pavilion, to replace those vandalised earlier this year; and that in future these lights will be taken down at the end of the Christmas season. In recognition of the importance of a working trolley for use by the Maintenance Person and to mitigate the ongoing challenge of punctures to existing pneumatic tyres (especially from blackthorn), it was agreed to source replacement hard wheels or a replacement trolley with hard wheels.

Jubilee Playground

The annual safety inspection of the playground equipment has been instructed and should take place in the next couple of months.

Thanks

The Council expressed appreciation for a range of voluntary services carried out recently on behalf of the parish - including the provision and delivery of suitable materials to go on the bonfire for the firework event, and the generous loan of equipment (by Gregg of GCE Groundworks in Fenstanton) to compact materials to fill potholes in the Village Hall car park.

Future meetings

The Council agreed to move the date of the April 2026 Parish Council Meeting back a week; from 6th (being Easter Monday) to 13th.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 1st December 2025 in Hilton Village Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.hiltonparishcouncil.com. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

Life on a Plate

Baked Stuffed Mushrooms

This is a quick and very tasty dish, which can be a starter for eight or a main course for four. As a starter it takes a bit of beating. Accompany it with speciality bread (herb, olive or Mediterranean) to make it perfect.

Ingredients:

8 large, flat mushrooms

1oz (25gm) butter

4 rindless rashers of lean bacon, chopped

1 onion, finely chopped

2oz (50gm) fresh wholemeal bread crumbs

2 tbs (30ml) freshly chopped parsley

2 tbs (30ml) grated Parmesan cheese

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190°C, 375°F, Gas Mark 5.
- 2. Remove the mushroom stalks, chop finely and set aside.
- 3. Place bacon, onion and half the butter in a pan and cook for 5-6 minutes, stirring occasionally until golden. Remove from the heat and add the mushroom stalks, breadcrumbs, parsley and seasoning to
- 4. Spoon the mixture into the mushrooms, pressing down gently. Melt the remaining butter and use it to brush the outside of the mushrooms.
- 5. Sprinkle the cheese over the top and place mushrooms on a lightly-greased baking tray in the oven for 10-15 minutes.
- Serve immediately and await praise.

Thinking about getting married abroad?

Thinking of marrying abroad as a British national may require additional documentation, most commonly a Certificate of No Impediment (CNI), sometimes called a "No Impediment to Marry" certificate. A CNI is an official document, typically issued by a registry office or similar authority, confirming that the named individual is legally free to marry. It evidences the absence of legal barriers such as an existing marriage, prohibited degrees of relationship, or failure to meet minimum age requirements.

Many foreign jurisdictions require a CNI from non-nationals before permitting a marriage to take place. This safeguard aims to prevent bigamy, underage marriage, and other issues that could render a marriage invalid under either local law or the law of the parties' home country. Requiring a CNI helps local authorities confirm that both parties have capacity to marry in accordance with both the destination country's law and the parties' domestic law.

The application process and criteria vary by country of residence, but the typical steps are:

- Attend the local registry office (some regions permit online or postal applications, though personal attendance is often required).
- Provide supporting documents, including proof of identity (passport), proof of residence, and evidence of the dissolution of any previous marriage (final divorce decree or former spouse's death certificate). A sworn affidavit of freedom to marry may also be required.
- Pay the prescribed fee.
- Allow for processing time, which can range from several days to several weeks.
- Arrange translation and legalisation where necessary. If marrying in a non-Englishspeaking jurisdiction, an official translation may be required. Some countries require legalisation or an apostille.

It is essential to check the specific requirements of the country where the marriage will occur. Some jurisdictions impose strict rules, demanding that the CNI be issued within a defined timeframe prior to the ceremony. Note that the UK does not issue CNIs for every

country. In those circumstances, alternative documentation—such as an affidavit or statutory declaration confirming freedom to marry—may be acceptable to the foreign authority. Early planning is advisable to ensure timely issuance, translation, and legalisation so that the ceremony can proceed without administrative hurdles.

Additional pre-marital considerations include pre-nuptial agreements (prenups). A prenup is a contract entered into before marriage that sets out how assets and finances will be treated upon divorce. In England and Wales, while prenups are not automatically binding, courts increasingly give them significant weight if safeguards are observed: both parties should receive independent legal advice, give full financial disclosure, and sign free of duress—commonly at least 28 days before the wedding. A well-drafted prenup may be particularly effective in shorter marriages or where substantial pre-acquired or family assets, business interests, or inheritances are at stake. and can offer clarity and protection for wealth intended for children from prior relationships.



Hilton Women's Institute

In this new millennium, the achievements of women mean literally that 'the sky's the limit' with women successfully flying to space. However, these achievements have been hard won, mainly by the determination of some women who literally looked to the skies from the first flight itself in 1903.

At our October meeting, Guy Bartlett spoke of seven such pioneer women, a talk entitled 'British Women in Aviation'. Bear in mind that women could not have a bank account in their own name except by a man's guarantee until 1928, so these women had much to fight against and this article will begin in modern times and work back to emphasise how much is owed to these few pioneers.



Jo Slater - The First British Woman Jet Pilot Jo joined the Royal Air Force at 18 as an officer, firstly as an engineer. When women were first allowed to front line combat in 1992 she gained her wings and was posted to 617 squadron - named the famous Dambusters. It meant two years of detailed training to learn how everything in the aircraft worked. Jo flew Tornados during the Falklands war, learned low level flying at 500mph at under 250 feet to avoid radar detection and was the first woman to pass that test.

She once said 'it was exciting, dramatic and demanding - flying can be exhilarating but tough so it's a mixture of challenge and adventure.'



Barbara Harmer
- The Only British
Woman To Fly Concorde

Born in 1953, Barbara left school at 15 to train as a hairdresser, then at 20 she left to learn to fly as a commercial pilot at her own expense (in the year 2000 this cost around £100,000). After gaining her Commercial pilot's licence, she made over 100 job applications (which were unsuccessful because she was a woman) before securing a job as a pilot at Genair, a small commuter airline based at Humberside Airport.

In 1984, she joined British Caledonian, which was taken over by British Airways in 1987. At that time, British Airways had 3,500 pilots

of which only 60 were women. She then successfully applied to fly the new Concorde and after six months in training finally captained a Concorde flight to New York in 1994. When that aircraft was permanently grounded, Barbara was transferred to Boeing 737s for 10 years.



Lettice Curtis - Air Transport Auxiliary
Lettice was born in 1915 and trained to fly
at the age of 22, funded with £100 from her
grandfather. At the start of WW2 women
were only allowed to join the Air Transport
Auxiliary (ATA) delivering aircraft from
factories in northern England to fighter
stations in the south, so Lettice enlisted. In
the course of the war, she delivered 1,500
planes of 90 different types, including 160
Spitfires and 120 Mosquitoes and she was
the first woman to fly an Avro Lancaster and
four-engined bombers.

A journalist once said of her and her colleagues - and ladies this will shock you -

'the menace is the woman who thinks she ought to be flying a high speed bomber when she only has the intelligence to scrub a hospital floor.'

Note - for five years she was working unremittingly for 13 days on and two days off. Lettice continued to fly in various positions before retirement, then at 77 and bored, she trained to fly helicopters and 'grounded herself' in 1995 aged 80!

Joy Lofthouse- Equal Pay Volunteer
Aged only 20 in 1943, Joy applied to join the
ATA and was one of only 17 accepted from
2,000 applicants without having driven a car!
Once flying, Joy discovered that the men
of the ATA were paid more than the women
for the same conditions and proceeded
successfully to lobby the management, who
then became the first equal opportunity
employer in 1943. Some achievement! Joy
once said of the Spitfire 'it was the iconic
plane, the nearest thing to having wings of
your own'.

Dolly Shepherd - Parachute Pioneer
Dolly was born in 1886. In 1902, at the age of
16 and passionate about the music of Sousa,
who was in concert at the Alexandra palace,
she took a waitress' job there because she
couldn't afford a ticket. Backstage, Dolly
found kites and gliders (remember this is
1902!) and in due course became part of the

Buffalo Bill troupe.

could walk!

In 1905 Dolly was on a trapeze below a hot air balloon due to rise to 2.000 - 4.000 feet but it malfunctioned and she rose rapidly to 15,000 feet before successfully landing. Worse was still to come during another escapade. Dolly and her colleague, Louie May, were each flying high by parachute (this is entertaining?) when Louie May's descent mechanism failed. Dolly somehow managed to get to Louie May with her own parachute thus preventing her rapid rise, only for them to land so heavily that Dolly was paralysed and bedridden. Then a doctor offered the chance of electric shock treatment but gave her too much, causing Dolly to be thrown from her bed and to hit a wall. Wow! This

caused her spine to return to normal and she

A daring lady with great spirit, Dolly accepted an offer to jump with the Red Devils display team. She was only 92! Dolly said she loved to go high because 'if I had to be killed, I'd like it to be completely good and proper'. (Thanks to the Dolly Shepherds of this world, times HAVE changed).

Hilda Hewlett - The First British Woman To Gain A Pilot's Licence.

Born in 1864 in Vauxhall, London and one of nine siblings, Hilda firstly trained as a nurse in Berlin and was already skilled in woodwork, metalwork and needlework. After a brief but failed marriage, Hilda happened to go to an Airshow in Blackpool in 1909 and decided there and then that she wanted to fly - but every Flying School refused women. The only choice was to train in France and Hilda finally gained her licence, only the number 122 and the first woman - at the Royal Aero Club in 1911.

In France she had met two men and they formed a new flying school where she taught Geoffrey de Havilland to fly in a Sopwith Camel aeroplane. Hilda was also one of the first women to learn to drive and in 1912 she moved to Battersea, set up a car repair garage and was one of the first to use an oxyacetylene welding machine.

To read more of this remarkable woman and her daughter you can read her biography entitled 'Old Bird'. Hilda's husband had once said 'women will never be as successful as men, they haven't got the nerve'. Opinion, ladies?



Yes, it has been a long road, well earned, look at us now and how optimistic the young girls of today can be with their choice of career.

The warm summer meant that outdoor tomatoes grew well and a delicious green tomato chutney made with the fruit that didn't ripen.
