Ed Kelly, our very good friend and member of the Legion for over 40 years, very sadly passed away on Saturday September 6th aged 101.

We have already informed our readers of this, his momentous year from His Majesty King Charles awarding him the MBE in the New Year Honours, the loss of his beloved wife Joan and his visit to Windsor Castle to receive his medal. There, Ed informed His Majesty that on her late majesty Queen Elizabeth's Coronation Day in 1953 he was the navigator of the lead aircraft of the fly past and the young Prince Charles had waved to him!

His was an illustrious career - so young, aged 21 on VE Day 1945; then only recently he attended the 80th Anniversary Remembrance of VJ Day in St Ives.

He was so very definitely yet another member of that special generation .

## Is your landline your lifeline?

Landlines are changing. By January 2027\*, traditional landlines will be upgraded with digital technology. This national upgrade is known as the Digital Switchover and will mean that landline calls will be made over the internet instead of the old telephone network. Telephone providers are responsible for switching customers to the upgraded service, but everyone is encouraged to check if and how the change will affect them.

#### Do you rely on a personal alarm or telecare device?

It's important to check how the Digital Switchover will affect you, especially if you also rely on personal alarms or telecare devices (like fall detectors or lifelines), which may stop working.

For many, the change will be simple. All you will have to do is plug your landline phone into a broadband router instead of a traditional phone socket. But if you don't have an internet connection at home, or if you rely on your landline every day, this change might affect you more.

#### 3 things you can do now to prepare for the Digital Switchover

- Call your phone company Ask if the change affects your phone line or any connected devices. Ask to speak to customer services and use the number on your most recent bill.
- Ask for help if you need it A trusted friend, family member or neighbour can help you make the call to your phone provider or speak to your provider on your behalf.
- Watch out for scams Your phone provider will not ask for money upfront. If something doesn't feel right, hang up and call the official number.



The good news is landlines are not going away, you can usually keep your existing phone and number, and it's the responsibility of your phone company to guide you through the process.

We know that for many people, the landline is more than just a phone - it's a lifeline. That's why **Connecting Cambridgeshire** is here to help make sure no one is left behind.

### Local libraries and community champions providing information hubs for vulnerable residents

Recognising that older and more vulnerable residents are best supported in trusted, community locations, libraries are acting as information hubs for the campaign. Every library, including community and mobile libraries in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough have free printed information available about the Digital Switchover. Particularly vulnerable residents, for whom their landline is a lifeline, should ask for a copy of the leaflet "Prepare for the Digital Switchover in 3 easy steps".

#### Some places of interest

This area of England has many links to the past and there are many places of interest within about 40 miles that bear witness to the life and times of people who lived around here from pre-historic times through to the present day.

This article will be the first in a series which is intended to help newcomers to the area discover some of our heritage – and it may also prompt some longer-established residents to visit, or revisit, some places of interest. We will feature a few in each article – but if we don't include somewhere that you think should be listed – just let us know and we can feature it in another edition of The Journal.

To keep the list to a manageable length, we are not going to include any towns or villages, as such, nor any of the Parish Churches, as they are so numerous they would probably justify a book of their own! The list will include the two wonderful cathedrals, at Ely and Peterborough, in due course. For the same reason, we are only planning to mention only two of the numerous nature reserves - because of their additional historic interest. And as number of the sites in the city of Cambridge would swamp the list, we won't include anything in Cambridge either. We will leave the sites in the city for readers to discover for themselves.

Our first "ports of call" are those nearest to Hilton, Fenstanton and Fen Drayton. We will go further afield in future articles in the series.

If you intend to visit any of the places listed, it will be worth checking the opening times as many of them are not open all year round, especially those that are managed by volunteers or are promoted by Historic Houses.

#### The Maze, Hilton PE28 9PF

The Hilton maze is one of only eight surviving turf mazes in England. It is at the western end of the village green and is managed by Hilton Parish Council.



#### Manor House, Hemingford Grey PE28 9BN

One of the oldest continuously inhabited houses in Britain. See Historic Houses website for details of opening times.



#### Norris Museum, St Ives PE27 5BX

A charming museum dedicated to Huntingdonshire's heritage. Open Monday - Saturday 10:00am - 4:00pm. Entry is free



#### Old bridge chapel, St Ives PE27 5UW

One of only three – or arguably four - chapels on bridges in England. An information pack and the key are available at the Norris Museum.



#### Porch Museum, Godmanchester PE29 2HB

Town museum in the old Queen Elizabeth School. Open on some weekends and for special events. See the museum's website for details.



#### Island Hall HH, Godmanchester PE29 2BA

An important mid-18th century mansion with fine gardens. See Historic Houses website for details of opening times.



#### **Bourn Windmill, Bourn CB23 2SU**

The oldest windmill in England, dating from the 16th Century. See Cambridge PPF website for details of open days and walking routes from Bourn and Camborne.



#### Watermill, Houghton PE28 2AZ

An impressive working watermill. Guided tours on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Also open for self-led tours at some other times. See National Trust website for details. Car Park and tea-room.



#### Cromwell Museum, Huntingdon PE29 3LF

Former grammar school attended by Oliver Cromwell. It has the best collection of items relating to him anywhere. See the museum's website for details of opening times.



#### Hinchingbrooke House, Huntingdon PE29 3BN

Stately home now part of Hinchingbrooke School. Open for special events and craft fairs. See the HBK Events page on Facebook for details.

# From island to village (Story of survival and restoration)

Growing up on a small Caribbean Island I always knew that I would travel the world, that I would have exceptional experiences and meet extraordinary people. It took me quite a while to put my thoughts on paper, but I finally realised that what I wanted to say did not require a dissertation but how I felt living in a village that would forever hold a special place in my heart.



The summer of 2022 I moved into the village of Papworth Everard, I was literally on the run with my then 2-year-old son and looking for a haven to call my home and start all over again after my dreams and hopes for a wonderful married life in the UK were completely shattered. With the support of a few friends and new-found family and the South Cambridgeshire council team I was able to get back on my feet.

Once I arrived in the village, I remembered the first person I met was a lady in a wheel chair (I won't mention her name) but I will call her 'T'. She introduced herself to me and my little one. Gave me an overview of the village and some things to look forward to. I felt warm and seeing the smile on his face I knew that I would enjoy living there.

Fast forward I was introduced to my church family in Hilton, who went above and beyond to ensure that not only did I have sufficient duvets but a support system that hovered over us like a protective glove. I no longer felt afraid, or alone or anxious. Those feelings silently started to disappear and as a praying woman I knew that God had sent the right people, the most exceptional people in my path. I eventually got back into my teaching career even though I struggled finding my way to and from work (the bus unfortunately was not always my friend). I made a home for myself and my son and created some of the best memories.

As I write this on the anniversary of my moving to my little village just outside of Cambridge, I am now back in my own village, my little island surrounded by the Caribbean Sea. I made the bold step to return home so that my son can experience a different kind of village filled with familial love and moments. I will forever cherish the time we spent in the village, the kind faces at the Coop, the delicious sandwiches at the pub. The schools that took care of my little one and the warmth from my neighbours and complete strangers.

Now that I am back home, I am reminded of the little girl with big dreams and an adventurous heart who was ready to conquer the world. When I stepped off the plane, I thought 'was it always this hot' but the warm greetings and melodious voices echoing 'Welcome home' the sing-song notes of the Vincentian creole brought me back to me roots and I smiled I was home.

Already my son was complaining it was too hot and running around while concerned airport officials try to reassure him and me that he would soon be on the beach running around and would not even notice the heat.

Later that day we took the last Ferry over to Bequia, the island I was born on, grew up on and had some of the fondest memories I can think of. Seven square miles of rolling hills, white sand and crystal clear blue green waters. I sound like a commercial for Jet2 Holiday, but it is indeed beautiful. Once we boarded the ferry, familiar faces popped up and the greetings continued until the end of our forty-minute ride.

So much had changed yet the heart of the island remained. My dad stood waiting for us at the dock and naturally tears came to my eyes although I had seen him a few months before; my son's excitement was palpable. I was overjoyed to be home, there was a lot of activities on the island now you could hear the children laughing and playing, there was local music and merriment everywhere (It was Easter Monday activities).

Once we got to the house and I saw my mum I felt like my journey was completed, it had been five years since I last saw her and the first time she would see her grandson in person. We hugged we talked, I cried, we laughed. It was indeed a great feeling to be home

Fast forward today, my son is about to start kindergarten at my old alma mater, I am back into teaching, and all seems right with the world. While I am still adjusting to island life, the heat, the slower pace, the lack of a Coop. My son has embraced his new home; he loves the water and cries whenever we leave

and has embraced his extended family with an open heart and lots of hugs. It's a new season, a new journey, a new adventure and this time I have a little more company.


A lot has changed on Beguia, but it remains one of the most beautiful islands I know, not because of its boat building, whaling



Cllr Sarah Conboy, Executive Leader of Huntingdonshire District Council, said: "Centuries of rich history have shaped Huntingdonshire into the place it is today – somewhere people want to live, work, and stay. We are proud of our thriving market towns, flourishing villages, and excellent connections across the region".

The campaign launch comes as the council continues to work with partner authorities on Local Government Reorganisation.

Huntingdonshire is contributing to the development of Option B, which would create two new unitary councils: one covering Peterborough, East Cambridgeshire, Fenland and Huntingdonshire, and another covering Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire. Both would also take on existing County Council services.







At the same time, the council is engaging in discussions on Option

A, which proposes a different split - one council for Peterborough, Huntingdonshire and Fenland, and another for Cambridge City, East Cambridgeshire and South Cambridgeshire again with County Council services included.

In addition, Huntingdonshire is independently reviewing Option C, which suggests one council for Peterborough, East Cambridgeshire and Fenland, and another for Cambridge City, Huntingdonshire and South Cambridgeshire, with County Council services also incorporated.

A formal decision on the Council's preferred option is expected in the autumn, with an Extraordinary Council meeting scheduled for November. Final decisions on reorganisation will rest with the Minister of State for Local Government and English Devolution, following government consultation.

#### Duty, Courage, Fortitude - They Came Back

The sacrifices of all in wars have long been honoured and rightly so. Now, as the annual Poppy Appeal approaches, some remembrance can be given to those who were called up or volunteered to 'do their bit', later to return home to families and previous lives.

So here are just a few tragic, traumatic, amusing and courageous stories of fathers, grandfathers and uncles of present day Hilton people who saw them return to give them life. You may know some of them!

#### The Royal Navy - the Senior Service.

Margaret Andrew's father, David Haswell served on a destroyer on the Russian Convoys. He survived a torpedo attack when a mate standing nearby was hit on the head by their dart board and David was discharged to the deck below! His only ever comment was 'oh, it was SO cold'.

In later civilian life David worked in accounts for the Frigidaire company!

Ian Stott's grandfather James Stott and uncle Jeffery, ('Bill') both commanded Merchant Navy vessels for Ellermans Lines sailing out of Hull. 'Bill' sailed in convoy SC42 which we think also included David's fleet and that of Lesley Martin from Hilton whose ship was torpedoed on September 19th 1941. His name is listed on our Lychgate Memorial.

Jeff Shaw's uncle was torpedoed three times and he survived to live a long life in Christchurch.

Jan Booth's father, Richard, was a 1st Lieutenant on the escort destroyer HMS Wheatland which was sent to Jakisnica on the Croatian island of Pag. There, he took a contingent of men ashore to map the coastline. After the war he was drafted to the South African Police Force in Plumtree, Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe).

Jan's mother, Margaret, joined the WRENS as a nurse from home in the Kingdom of Fife. After the war she became a house mother to orphans being sent to Rhodesia where she met Richard.

#### The Army.

The father of Julian Thomas served in the Royal Artillery and arrived at Tobruk during an air raid. He was a gun captain on a 25 pounder field gun. Then, as a front observer seeking targets, he was spotted, shelled and badly wounded, needing 18 months in hospital, to be invalided out in 1945 and was thus badly affected throughout his life.

Simon Perry's grandfather, Clifford Perry, was born in Leeds and was a Grenadier Guardsman with the rank of sergeant. For a time he was based in North Africa under General Montgomery's leadership, then Berlin, where he met Selma. They fell in love, in due course were married and lived in north London before they came to run Hilton's

shop, supported later by Brian with Anne and then Simon. A romantic story maybe, but tinged with poignancy because Clifford's family were so utterly opposed to Selma's German nationality that they never again saw or spoke to them. Brian met and married Anne whose own father, Gordon, had joined the Royal Air Force and was stationed at RAF Oakington where his work involved transporting the bodies of personnel to their final resting place. Generously, he spent much time organising parties and gatherings for local troops.

Sandy Monk's father served in the Royal Artillery and, because he was unable to march due to a childhood foot injury, he was helping to look after prisoners of war, one of whom copied this beautiful picture of her mum from a photograph. Several of his friends were killed

and he always felt that he had a lucky escape.

Robert Young, John Young's father, was on convoy duty with REME on a Harley Davidson. One day he was helping to load tanks onto ships and the one he was moving had explosives fixed into the tank under the seat to deter the enemy from using them. On this occasion the explosive was activated and he had to sit motionless for some considerable time while it was deactivated. As a result of this experience Robert had a nervous breakdown. Post war, Robert was a draughtsman designing cable cars for slag heaps and machines for Mr Kipling cakes factories.

John's mum, Margaret, lived in Ashton under Lyne and worked with the Pay Corps on sad events dealing with the sometimes bloodied pay books of men who had been killed in action - in order to assess the correct money due to the family left behind.

Phyllis See's husband Percy was at the battle of Tobruk when one day an explosive device killed a mate at either side of him but he was unscathed. Fate was his saviour.

Linda Stott's father, Tom Sutton was a leading aircraftman in the RAF, stationed at Manston in Kent. He was one of four brothers in the family to serve during WWII. His oldest brother, Joe, was a lance corporal

in the army; his next oldest brother, Gilbert, was a driver in the RASC and was evacuated from Dunkirk. His younger brother, Geoffrey, served in the RAF in Burma at the age of 19. Happily, they all returned home at the end of the war.

Sidney Elliott was born in 1913. His army life involved supplies at the battle of Tobruk - a 'Desert Rat'. Later, Sidney found himself in Gibraltar, helping to care for the famous Barbary Apes and bizarrely by means of a blessing he learned of his wife's future pregnancy. That child was to be Mike Elliott, soon to celebrate a significant birthday!

**Mike's mum, 'Betty'** had also joined the Army, manning anti-aircraft guns around London.

Jenny Studd's cousin Dennis was in Japan and was typically ever silent about it although Jenny once overheard her father ask him if he had killed a man. His reply was 'Uncle Ted, it was either him or me'. He did return but suffered attacks of malaria all his life.



Ruth Salem's father was posted to RAF Scampton and Coningsby as a meteorologist with 617 squadron, of Barnes Wallis fame, and Wing Commander Guy Gibson and his dog became a family friend. On the night of the raid on the Dams, the Air Officer Commanding, Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Harris urgently needed to use Ruth's father's top secret (scrambled) phone line in the Met office. The request to the connecting

telephonist was thus: 'Give me Winnie please.' Then: 'Glad to say, sir those dams have gone!' Winnie who? You know!

Andy Bush's father, Ken, joined the Royal Air Force in 1943 aged 17 ready to train as an NCO pilot. He left from Chatteris police station where his father was a police inspector. After some months of flying training, off he went to train to fly the twinengined Mosquito aircraft, then the fastest in the world. His comment is a classic: 'can you imagine how marvellous a prospect it was as an 18 year old to play with an expensive 400 mph aircraft full of guns and bombs?'

Finally, let us reflect on the words of Duty, Courage and Fortitude with this second poignant memory from Bobbie Brown.

Bobbie Brown's father was one of eight sons, each of whom thankfully returned. Their next door neighbour had only one son and he did not return to his father and mother. What grief to endure?

We have so much for which to thank each and many more of such fine people.





#### Afoot in the Garden

## **Autumn Lawn Care**

My wife is a genius? We have a new puppy and she suggested that, as the gardener, I should be the one to show him where to wee in the garden with a demonstration!

Thankfully as a sausage dog he cannot yet (if ever) cock his leg! Which neatly leads me onto female dogs' wee burning patches in the lawn. Female dogs' wee can cause lawn burn and you can buy propriety products to add to their drinking water, or, I am told, you could add a teaspoon of white vinegar per half a litre of their drinking water. However, this can cause problems in some dogs, especially those on medication, so always check with your vet before putting any additives in their drinking water. An alternative solution is to train the dog to wee in a particular spot then water the area to dilute the urine.

Lawns are an important feature in our gardens, creating a green carpet to show off our borders. Lawn edging, pruning overhanging evergreens and weed and moss treatments carried out in the autumn (but often left till spring) will pay dividends next year. Autumn leaves are perfect for composting, to stop them clogging gutters and drains, turning paving into a slip hazard and smothering grass. Lawn mower blades should be raised a notch at this time of year.

#### **Tasks for October**

The soil is still warm enough for autumn planting of trees, shrubs, climbers, bulbs and winter bedding, including pots and tubs. Tidy and mulch your borders - less hardy plants like fuchsias and salvias benefit from a good layer around their base for winter protection. Direct sow hardy annuals and perennials to flower next year. Sow in rows, marking where you have planted them with canes or pebbles. Clean patios and paths, especially in shady areas (repoint

as necessary). Hose pipes can be drained and packed away for the winter, while taps should be isolated and wrapped to prevent them from freezing. Check fencing and timber structures, oil hinges, check latches, locks and garden lighting.

Finally, on sunny days take a moment to enjoy the autumn colour!



The War Memorial is in the Fenstanton Parish Cemetery, which is adjacent to the churchyard and primary school. All are welcome to join us for either or both services. 



It had seemed that the days of George Cadbury, Angela Burdett-Coutts, George Peabody and Andrew Carnegie, to name a but a few who lived in the Victorian and Edwardian eras, were over, as self-interest prevailed. Interestingly, not all of the above were driven by any particular Christian belief, but by a humanitarian outlook.

Living a good life, one that enriches those around us, especially those who need our help, should be our aim.

I would rather shake the hands of those who do good without reward, or thought for themselves, than shake the hands of those who wear the cloak of respectability covering a meanness of spirit.

This will probably be my last A View from The Old Manse, as we are hoping to have a new minister, who will, I hope, take over contributing to the Journal. Indeed, by the time that you read this, the decision by the three United Reformed Churches will have been made.

#### New Highways reporting system

County Councillor, Chris Poulton - Papworth and Swavesey division

The county council's new Highways asset management system, Aurora, went live on Monday 22 September.

#### Under the new system:

- Customer fault reports are automatically directed to the correct officer or team, ensuring they are handled by the right person first time.
- All Highways maintenance officers are equipped with tablets, allowing them to inspect defects, raise work orders, and update customers directly while on site.

- New workflows automatically escalate reports not progressed within agreed service level timescales.
- Performance dashboards ensure no cases are overlooked.
- Officers can send updates directly from the system, meaning residents receive regular progress updates on their reports.
- Reports are managed dynamically by officers in the field and loaded into inspection routes so they can be reviewed at the same time.
- The system tasks officers with inspecting completed work and identifying defects. If any defects are identified they are flagged to contractors and corrected.

#### Local developments

I recently talked about the Boxworth Turn Development logistic site which could result in over 500 extra lorries a day visiting the site; potentially causing runoff water and sewage problems as well as overnight parking issues for our villages.

In September we were informed about a potential business park on the land between Bar Hill and Oakington with over a 1000 new jobs, which would again increase the number of lorries visiting the area. I have asked for a meeting with SCDC planning officers and parish councillors to understand their thinking

in relation to the emerging local plan and they have agreed to arrange one.

Plans for the new unitary authorities move forward slowly with the county councillors opting for a north/south split of Peterborough, Fenland, Huntingdon and South Cambs, East Cambs, Cambridge City. Talks are ongoing, but at the end of the day it will be down to a government decision in the new year.




#### The Witchfinder General in Fen Drayton

Some of us may have seen the 1968 film The Witchfinder General, staring Vincent Price as the eponymous Witchfinder General, Mathew Hopkins, who travelled the country in the 1640s offering to identify and cleanse communities of witches. This was a sad and shameful episode, prompted by puritanical zeal, lack of understanding of medical problems, fear and malice and the willingness of towns and villages to pay for the services of a witchfinder.

Dr Malcolm Gaskill of Churchill College has written a book entitled Witchfinders: a Seventeenth-Century English Tragedy (2006),





which is a study of the witch hunts of 1645–1647 in East Anglia.

John Stearne (1610 -1670) was born in Long Melford and farmed near Bury St Edmunds. Based on his accusations, in July 1645 in Chelmsford, 29 people were accused of witchcraft, of which four died in prison before trial and 15 were found guilty and hanged. Mathew Hopkins (1620-1647), born in Wenham Suffolk, who had trained as a lawyer, met Stearne and offered his services. Soon the younger man took the lead and became the self-styled witchfinder general, whilst Stearne was often referred to as the witch pricker.

They operated throughout East Anglia, although very little in Cambridgeshire. Imagine my surprise then when I noted that in 1646 they visited Over and Fenny Drayton. No doubt the news had spread they were nearby and the fear of a visit must have been very real. Every village had its old lady dressed in black, a widow or spinster and someone they called their village idiot.

Just think, Vincent Price . . . sorry, Mathew Hopkins, probably visiting the Three Tuns, the Horse and Gate or the Three Horseshoes.

Dr Gaskill summarised John Stearne's diaries:

"Over is in poor condition with strife due to loss of land through drainage and loss of life due to disease. One witch had forewarning of our coming and had plucked the Devil's

mark from her body. Fenny Drayton is also struggling - the parish fighting with the tenant farmer of their absentee lord. They resent that their parsonage is in the gift of Christ's College, which appoints ministers of scandalous lives and unsound doctrine. Several poor women were examined here and made large confessions. The Devil had warned them of our arrival. The Devil was shown to have lied about providing for them in exchange for their souls. No prosecution was upheld."

Eventually the courts started to question these men and their methods (which included torture) and also similar accusers

throughout England and Scotland. It is said some magistrates concerned at the validity of the accusations had the accused dressed in different clothes and re-paraded with others and when not picked out, set them free.

When a suspect was thrown into a village pond, if the basic element, water, rejected them and they floated, that was proof they were guilty. If the water accepted them and they sank they were 'without evil', but of course may well have drowned. Altogether around 500 women and men had been put to death before this aberration ended.

Hopkins died young of natural causes and Stearne retired to his farm but kept writing about witchcraft. It is his writings that are said to have encouraged the infamous Salem witch trials of 1692/3 in America.

The most famous witch trial in this area is that of the previous century, the Warboys Witches in 1589. The last person to be convicted under the Witchcraft Act 1735 was in 1944, although it is apparent she was probably acting as a fraudulent medium.

#### **Major Oak Assessment**

The Council discussed the professional assessment report, commissioned at the July meeting, and agreed to seek further clarification from the author about the decay analysis and proposed next steps before actioning the recommendations.

#### **Green Spaces**

The Council agreed to the purchase of a new sander for use by the Maintenance Person; and further attachments to the Council's strimmer required for essential ditch work.

Reports of two fallen trees are being followed up.

The Council discussed concerns about machinery needing to be taken over the Green and confirmed the safety of parishioners must take precedence which is why the fence around the Major Oak is in place, and should the fence be moved temporarily it must be returned to its current position; also, that crossing of the Green by heavy machinery should always be by using the designated rights of way.

#### **Food Waste**

The Council was informed by the District Councillor of plans to introduce food waste collection caddies during 2026.

#### **Traffic and Speed Concerns**

Following the recent consultation process, a report on proposals to introduce new speed restrictions will be shared with the County Councillor later in September; at a meeting to which the Parish Council has not been invited to attend.

#### Summer news

The Council heard that Cricket Courses had been very successful, a fly tip on Graveley Way had been witnessed and reported to the District Council. There has been a spate of vandalism – including of the Christmas lights and fire-related incidents. Following a recruitment process and interview, an extraordinary meeting of the Council was held in August to approve the appointment of a Deputy Clerk.

#### The Journal

The Council agreed to make a grant of £1000 to support the ongoing publication of The Journal; and noted similar support has been approved by Fenstanton and Fen Drayton Parish Councils.

#### **Bonfire Night**

The Council was given an update on preparations and approved an increased budget of £1800 for this event (up from £1600). It was noted the firework display will be at 6.00pm and the bonfire lit subsequently at 7.00pm, on Saturday 8th November.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 6th October 2025 in Hilton Village Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.hiltonparishcouncil.com. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

#### **Chicken in Cornflakes**

#### Family Law update - Protecting what's yours: The impact of Standish v Standish

On 02 July 2025 the UK Supreme Court made a decision in the case of Standish v. Standish. Put simply, just because something is in your spouse's name or even transferred during the marriage, does not automatically mean it is subject to division on a divorce. In this case Clive Standish, a retired banker, moved around £80 million to his wife, Anna, back in 2017. It was not intended as a windfall for her but part of a tax plan for their children. Fast forward to their divorce, and the transfer became the area of dispute. The High Court originally gave the wife a £45 million settlement but after appeals and finally the Supreme Court's decision, the wife received closer to £25 million. This is reported to be the largest reduction ever made to a financial settlement awarded on divorce.

#### What the Judges decided

The ruling makes three key points:

- Where money comes from matters Assets brought into the marriage or received as gift or inheritance, are usually viewed as nonmatrimonial. This means that they do not automatically fall to a 50/50 division sharing pot.
- Sharing only applies to shared assets the sharing principle only applies to matrimonial property e.g. wealth built together during the marriage, for example savings or a family home. Pre-marriage or gifted wealth does not go into the same category.
- Treatment counts If a couple clearly treats something as joint, then it may become matrimonial property. However, in the current case shifting money for tax purposes was insufficient to turn it into joint marital wealth.

#### Who's lived here?

This is the fourth essay in a short series of famous Fenstanton residents. With all the new housing erected in the village over the past few years it is more than likely that many of the people new to the village will not have heard of these people.

#### Royalty in Fenstanton: Joan, Queen of Scotland and Lord of the Manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton

Joan was the wife of Alexander II of Scotland and she was also known as Joanna. She was born 22 July 1210 and died 04 March 1238. She was the Queen consort of Scotland until her death. Joan was the eldest legitimate daughter and third child of King John of England and Countess Isabella of Angouleme. She was the sister of King Henry III and the lord of the manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton.



Joan's wedding took place in York Minster on 19 June 1221. At that time Joan was not quite twelve years old and Alexander was twenty one. King Henry III attended the wedding and the royal dynasties of Scotland and England were united in the person of the new Scottish queen, a queen who had been born to a reigning English king.

By October 1234 King Henry III had granted

to Joan for life the manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton. At that time Fenstanton was not a particularly valuable manor, but Henry granted Joan privileges (income from local taxes and tolls) that made it more lucrative, including provision to build a house here.

In 1235 the queen built herself a house here in Fenstanton and the king gave her twenty oaks and other timber from the Forests of Weybridge and Sapley (Huntingdon) for the purpose. The building took the form of a mighty timber built medieval hall befitting a lord of the manor, a queen and a sister of a king. The hall was surrounded by a large moat of which today only the village pond remains. What remained of this timber building was demolished in 1701 to make way for the present Grove House.

Although Queen Joan was the lord of the manor of Fenstanton she did not live here in the village and the manor house would not have been her home. Rather it would have been a nice place for her steward to live in but with luxury apartments for the queen and her husband when on their way to and from Scotland.

The couple regularly visited the English courts in and around London and Joan remained there through the autumn and early winter of 1237 after making an earlier pilgrimage to Canterbury. Early in 1238 she was taken ill at Havering Atte Bower (Romford) a favourite royal residence and on 04 March she died, still childless, cradled in her brother's arms (King Henry III). It is recorded that 'her death was grievous'.

#### When Queen Elizabeth I Visited Fenstanton in 1564:

Queen Elizabeth I was fond of escaping from London and visiting different parts of the country. Wealthy friends and relations

were just told to expect a visit from the queen. Every summer the queen would leave her great palaces, which were in or around London, and embark on a tour of her country. These tours were called 'progresses' and the queen enjoyed them very much. Who wouldn't when the hosts would feel 'obliged' to lavish small fortunes on providing, accommodation, banquets and entertainment!

The Queen would leave in procession from one of her palaces, seated on a horse or in a litter or coach, and her courtiers would accompany her, followed by hundreds of carts carrying their goods. It also allowed for the London palaces to be cleaned. At court there would normally be over 1,000 people, courtiers and servants etc. By the summer, when progresses took place, the moats and nearby rivers would stink. About a dozen royal palaces along the Thames were in use most of the year.

Bishop Richard Cox had palaces in Ely, Holborn Place in London and a deer park and hunting box at Somersham. For some unknown reason he leased a very large house in Fenstanton. This was a substantial manor house with formal Tudor gardens dating back to the 12th century replacing an earlier Saxon hall.

In its early years the manor house was considered equal to a palace, but by the time of her majesty's visit it was known as an episcopal palace. The mansion house or rectory (as it was then called) was seated at the east end of the Fenstanton village church yard and consisted of ten acres of gardens and land, a dwelling house together with its outbuildings and the adjacent land appropriated to its use.

Bishop Richard Cox (Bishop of Ely from 1559 to 1581) attended the queen on her visit to Cambridge University in 1564. The queen remained there for four days and she then left for Fenstanton where she had lunch with Bishop Cox and then on to Hinchingbrooke House where she was entertained by Sir Henry Cromwell.

#### Life in our classrooms

Fen Drayton is home to four classes:

 Dormice Class – Our Reception and Year 1 children enjoy a bright, spacious classroom with direct access to a dedicated outdoor area, allowing them to flow freely between indoor and outdoor learning all day long.



 Rabbits Class – Year 2 children form our smallest class and are based in our newest classroom. They benefit from a blend of structured learning and continuous provision throughout the day.

Foxes Class – Children in Years 3 and 4
make up our Foxes class, located at the
front of the school with views overlooking
what the children fondly call "The
Meadow."



 Badgers Class – Our oldest pupils in Years 5 and 6 are back in their beautifully restored classroom, which suffered some of the worst damage in the fire. Now fully refurbished, it's once again a bright and welcoming space for learning.

#### **Outdoor Developments**

Over the summer, the temporary mobile classrooms that served us so well last year were removed, and our much-loved school field has been reseeded and turfed. We're looking forward to seeing children running around on it again very soon. In the meantime, the views over the parish council



field and the park beyond are a welcome sight.

We're incredibly proud of our ever-growing vegetable garden, which is lovingly tended by a team of fantastic volunteers — a mix of staff, parents, and of course, the children themselves. What began as a few small beds has blossomed into a thriving garden full of vegetables, flowers, and plants. The produce is used in school, with any surplus often sold to local villagers. It's become a much-loved space during playtimes and lunchtimes.

A highlight of the summer term was our new sunflower seating area where each child and staff member planted a sunflower seed to create a stunning natural space for reflection and relaxation.

And there's more to come! We've got exciting outdoor projects planned over the coming months — stay tuned for updates!
